Solicited active Ontario Contesters to go
From 60 members in Summer 2002 to 145 Active by the end of 2003

34 contest weekends - those with Club Competitions plus 2 RAC Contests and the Ontario QSO Party

11 were CW-Only
10 were SSB-Only
9 were Mixed-Mode
of which
3 were VHF
5 were RTTY

Some occupied two weekends and special consideration was given to the short multiple Sprint and NAQP events
